

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

Aim	The aim of the Irish Potential Organ Donor Audit (IPODA) is to ensure that every person who is approaching the end of life in an Intensive Care Unit (ICU) and Emergency Department (ED) is offered the possibility of becoming an organ donor, where this is appropriate.
Objectives	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Quantify the potential for organ donation in acute Irish hospitals. 2. Identify opportunities for improvement in organ donation and where in the patient journey these opportunities occur. 3. Identify reasons for non-donation outcome. 4. Systematically assess the degree to which best practice standards in organ donation are met.
Overall function & Purpose	The purpose of IPODA is to conduct an audit of all deaths with the aim of identifying all organ donation opportunities.
Target population	All people who die in ICU and the ED.
